#### Fake License Detected

Patrolmen Shaylor and Ripley of the auto theft division Saturday arrested W. C. Hunnicutt of Vernonia, accused of having improper automobile plates on his car.

Hunnicutt was alleged to have pressed out the figure "7" in 1927 of his last year's plates, to have painted the space white and then to have painted the figure "8" over the space. The fact that the license number above was 259-237, whereas the numbers on the 1928 plates issued have yet to run that high, aroused suspicion of the police.—Oregonian.

### Per Capita Wealth Exceeds Most States

Oregon is one of six states with per capita wealth in excess of \$4,000, and ranks under only the states of Wyoming, South Dakota and Iowa. The state of Nevada leads the whole country with per capita wealth of \$7,299, while the figure for Oregon is placed at \$4,374, which is in excess of Nebraska and California, the other two states in the \$4,000 class.

The total wealth of Oregon is computed at \$3,775,000,000, and represents only its tangible, physical forms such as a land and improvements, the equipment of industrial enterprises and farms, livestock, railroads and public utility land and equipment, personal property, motor and other vehicles, but excludes gold and silver coin and bullion, credits and currency.

Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina and Arkansas are at the bottom of the list. The per capita wealth of the state of Washington is \$3,727, while that of Idaho is \$3,506. There are no eastern states in the higher brackets.

### New Cross Flow Radiator Feature of Latest Pontiac

The Oakland Motor Car company, continuing its pioneering activities which brought Duco, four-wheel brakes, the fuel pump and many other major developments to the motorist, has scored again through its introduction of an entirely new principle of heat radiation.

The "cross-flow" radiator, one of the features of the new series Pontiac six, has attracted a large share of attention among the critical "new stuff" enthusiasts who have thronged the automobile shows and the Oakland-Pontiac show rooms since the latest Pontiac was first shown on January 5.

Flowing horizontally through 384 inches of radiator core cooling surface, instead of vertically, this radiator takes advantage of the principle of condensation. It has 40 square inches more radiating surface than the old radiator and contains 12 quarts. It has two slide tanks, connected by a core with horizontal water passages and a top tank. Water from the engine enters the inlet tank and flows cross-ways through the core into the cool water tank on the other side. It is then returned to the engine. The cool water tank extends up the side and across the top where the filling cap is located.

While passing cross-wise through the core, any water or anti-freeze mixture which may have become vaporized in the engine is cooled and condensed before it reaches the vent. This is an improvement over the vertical type, where much

water is lost because of this vapor escaping through the overflow pipe. In cold weather, when alcohol or anti-freezing mixtures are used, it is particularly effective, due to the fact that these mixtures vaporize at a much lower temperature than water.

The rugged core on this radiator is another improvement, the core being supported on three sides by tanks instead of only on two.

Copper is used in the construction of this radiator, instead of brass, marking another departure in construction. Circulation is handled through a completely redesigned water pump which is similar to that on the Oakland All-American six. End thrust is greatly reduced through a balanced impeller. The fan is a 15-inch two-blade type, turns on bronze bearings and is driven by a belt. The cooling system is thermostatically controlled.

#### Home Pointers

If the skin on a chicken's leg is cut and the leg broken just below the knee joint, the tendon may be pulled out by a fork. This makes the "drum-stick" easier to eat.

In buying a roast, allow one-half pound for each adult member of the family.

A round-bone chuck roast is one of the best roasts of beef and one of the least expensive.

To vary French toast serve it with cherry sauce instead of sirup. To make sauce, dilute 1 tablespoon of corn starch with cold water and add 2 cups of stewed and pitted cherries. Stir and cook until boiling begins.

To make an orange filling for sandwiches, spread bread first with cream cheese, then spread with orange marmalade and cover. Shredded pineapple creamed into cream cheese makes a good combination. Crushed maple sugar added to chopped nuts and cream or condensed milk is also good.

Attractive lamp shades can be made with colored envelope linings by gluing them double over an ordinary foundation. Several coats of varnish applied over it gives the shade a glossy finish. A light globe inside aids in blending the colors artistically. These linings can also be used to cover a wooden box or a waste paper basket treated with varnish to give finish. The effect is a resemblance to a crazy quilt.

Luncheon sets are appropriate for use for breakfast, luncheon or informal dinner on the porch, or in formal suppers.

Candles give the most attractive lighting for the dining room. Their height depends on the size of the holders, tall candles are best in low standards and shorter ones in those of average height. The candles, always unshaded, are lighted before the guests enter the room.

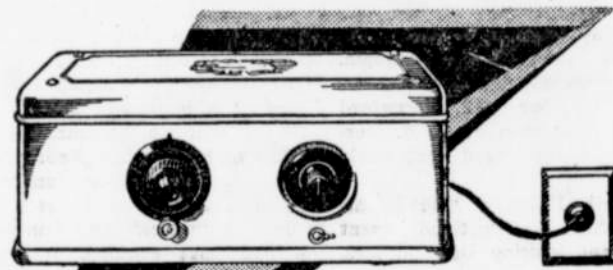
