ed: drinking water is safeguarded. How about the city's milk supply?

Science has studied for many years the problem of making the nearest perfect food of human beings safe for distribution many hours after it leaves the gentle dairy cow. A method has been worked out called pasteurization, named after its discoverer, Louis Pasteur, eminent French bacteriologist. This process consists merely of holding the milk thirty minutes at a temperature of 142 to 145 degrees Fahrenheit in a special sanitary tank, then quickly cooling and sealing in bottles.

Under this process the milk undergoes no appreciable change except that all harmful bacteria are removed. The milk is still as rich and wholesome as before and in no way is affected as simply boiling milk would do. From a clean cow in clean dairies, no human being touches the milk after it has been pasteurized until it reaches the consumer.

All leaders in public hygiene are now agreed that pasteurization is the best practical safeguard of the community's milk supply. Many large cities require all milk not certified to be pasteurized. Women are becoming united rapidly in a demand for this simple but effective health assurance, as is shown in a recent survey made by the National Dairy Council.

But, in addition to safeguarding the health of a community by the pasteurization of its milk supply, the keeping qualities of this highly perishable product are greatly increased by the process. Housewives who watch their food supply carefully find that pasteurized milk will keep fresh in a refrigerator much longer. In addition, women realize they can give pasteurized milk freely to growing children both the knowledge that it is not only safe for them, but the most nearly perfect food known.

Every parent wants her children to be strong, robust and healthy. At least a quart of pasteurized milk is needed by every growing child to meet the demand of a growing body, according to scientific research by world known authorities.

Any community that has experienced a series of epidemics which have been traced to the people handling a milk supply, no longer need be convinced of the necessity of a pasteurized supply. It is just another modern necessity caused by the handling of large quantities of food stuffs in a most modern and scientifically careful way.
