MISS GERTRUDE BATTLES LANE, editor of one of the leading women's publications in the country, was the first to return her card, is not only editor of the Woman's National Campaign headquarters a Hoover pledge post-card, one of more than a million being sent out by the National Republican Committeewomen to the women of the nation.

The Women's Division of the Republican National Committee has been deluged with these cards. Hundreds more are pouring in as each mail is received.

Miss Lane, to whom goes the honor for being the first to return her card, is not only editor of the Woman's Home Companion but is a member of the Women's Republican Club of New York City. She served as a member

of the Washington staff of the United States Food Administration under Herbert Hoover during the world war.

Spray Ants With Kerosene
 A simple way to destroy ants on lawns of small area is to spray with kerosene emulsion or with a very strong soap wash, prepared by dissolving any common laundry soap in water at the rate of 1/2 or 1 pound of soap to a gallon of water.

If the ant nests can be found, boiling water or a small quantity of kerosene will sometimes kill the insects in the nests. These fluids cannot, however, be applied in quantity with safety to the grass on lawns. In this case the soap wash should prove preferable.

Oakland Car Has Record For July

Continuing the record setting pace which has resulted in new high sales figures every month since the first of the year, the Oakland Motor Car company sold a total of 22,704 Oakland and Pontiac sixes during July. W. R. Tracy, vice-president in charge of sales, announces.

This compares with 16,752 units sold in July, 1927, or a gain of 35 1/2 per cent; and brings the total of new Oaklands and Pontiacs shipped since January 1 to 84,252 cars, Mr. Tracy said. The corresponding performance for the first seven months of 1927 was 112,888 units, or a gain of 63 per cent this year over last.

In view of the unusual record of the company to date, Mr. Tracy declared that the year 1928 promises to be a wide margin the most successful in the 22-year existence of the Oakland Motor Car company.

"Our combined output of Pontiac cars in 1927 was 192,966 units," he said. By the end of July of this year our sales had mounted to 184,252 new cars, leaving less than 9,000 units to go until we surpass the entire output of last year, which in turn was forty per cent better than in 1926.

"Extensive plans laid for the late summer and the fall of 1928 indicate that we will top last year's performance easily by another forty per cent or more. Sales of Pontiac sixes will take on an added spurt by reason of numerous refinements in the line announced recently.

"Our plans for the Oakland All-American six for the coming months also are extensive. The car should soar to record sales figures never before attained by this line during the latter part of the year. There is every indication that

our 1928 production and sales not only will reach the total units we announced on January 1 as our program for the year, but that the demand for the Oakland and Pontiac lines will make possible an even better showing.

"The national economic picture is better than we might normally have expected several months ago. Political issues are too vague to cause industrial uneasiness. Unemployment, where it was in evidence, has subsided to normal as a result of seasonal occupations. The trade horizon is fair, indeed.

"It is significant that our July sales were especially good in the outlying farming localities. The farming industry is the recognized pulse of our national wellbeing. With the farmer prosperous now and confident of the future outlook other lines of industry will go forward at an accelerated pace that should make the third and fourth quarters of the year decidedly better than in 1927."

Kirby in New York World, Feb. 20, 1920



THOSE qualifications and achievements which make Herbert C. Hoover so eminently desirable as the next President of the U. S. have never been better described than by Charles E. Hughes at the Carnegie Hall meeting at which the Civic Forum's medal for distinguished public service was conferred upon Mr. Hoover.

"The Americanism of Hoover is shown in every deed, in every utterance. His achievements dignified the nation, and established prestige for the American name abroad which even the mistakes of diplomacy cannot obscure. He bears a name illustrious because of remarkable achievements;

but, best of all, it is a name untarnished, expressive not only of exceptional ability but of the simple life of a modest citizen."

This is the opinion of a man who has been a distinguished Governor of New York, a distinguished Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, and the Republican candidate for President of the United States.
