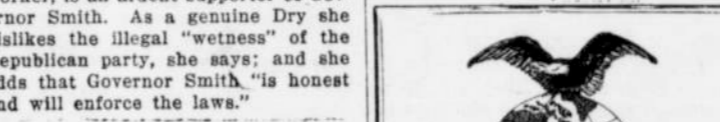
60 Famous Philanthropist. Life-long Republican, Will Vote for Smith.
