Certified Seed Clover in Oregon

Ladino clover was grown by a number of farmers in Oregon this year for seed certification. It is probable that there will be several good crops with certification complete, and, according to G. R. Hyslop, agronomist at the college, most of the certified supply of seed in the United States is in Oregon at present.

Supply Minerals in Mash

Fowls do not have much capacity to store minerals. Most of these necessary constituents have to be provided continually in the mash in the form of shell, salt, meat meals, ground bone, milk products and limestone.

Late Planted Grain Slow

Spring sown grain in Oregon is, if the season is good, likely to give more productive results than grain sown after the middle of November. Often the late planted grain is slow to sprout and a good deal of the seed rots, finds the experiment station.

the radio battery does not come in contact with them, for the fumes from the battery will weaken cottons or any sort of drapes.

When cut flowers begin to droop, put them in fresh water, then plunge scissors and hand into the water and snip off an inch or two of the stems. No air can enter the stems and in a short time the flowers will revive.

To determine the freshness of eggs place an egg in a basin of cold water, and it should sink. If a fresh egg is held in front of a candle flame in a dark room the center will look clear.

Soiled gasoline may still be usable as the impurities will settle to the bottom and the clear gasoline may be poured from the top.

For paint varnish stains probably the best solvents are turpentine, alcohol and ammonia.

Meat juice or blood stains are protein compounds and heat coagulates these substances as it would an egg and for that reason is avoided. Two methods for removing these stains are soaking the spot in cold water, then washing with soap, or adding ammonia or salt to water, and washing with soap.

To raise the nap of wool goods place a wet piece of the same material over the spot and iron with a moderately hot iron. The piece will adhere and the nap raises when pulled apart. If the nap is worn off this will accomplish very little.

When cleaning with gasoline, the garment is best well covered with gasoline and placed in a tightly covered vessel and allowed to stand several hours, or over night. If the gasoline is warmed by being placed in a dish of hot water, the dirt will be dissolved more quickly and easily.

(From School of Home Economics) Gravy is made glossy by adding salt to flour before moistening. Warm water in place of cold insures a smooth product.

With roast pork or ham, cinnamon apples or pineapple browned in butter are delicious.

If it is desirable to keep scrambled eggs hot for a time after preparing, they may be cooked in a double boiler and kept there until time for serving.

The best salad course at dinner is a light course. One of the several salad greens with a dressing is preferable. Meat, fish, and sweet fruit salads at dinner, are considered too heavy.

For those who like cheese, there are many good dishes. Cottage cheese may be used as a salad, in sandwiches, or in a hot loaf. The flavor of cheese combines well with eggs, pears, pineapple, apples, bananas, asparagus, cauliflower, peas, celery and potatoes.

Limestone Good For Lawns

Ground limestone is often a very satisfactory dressing for lawns that are made up principally of Kentucky blue grass or white clover. On lawns of this type it is not advisable to use sulfate of ammonia as it tends to make the land too sour for the blue grass and clover and this established. If creeping bent is used in the lawn it is undesirable to use limestone at all, but liberal applications of sulfate of ammonia are good. The creeping bent grass will usually thrive in soils that are too sour for most of the weeds so that after a few years' application of sulfate of am-

monia generally the creeping bent is able to survive where many of the weeds will not.
