Store Honey in Dry Place. Honey in Oregon is stored in a warm dry place for best keeping quality, says H. A. Scullen, bee specialist at the state college. Honey so stored will keep for months, even years. It will not keep well, however, if stored in a cold, damp cellar. The cans rust and, if it is comb honey, it is likely to draw moisture and granulate much more quickly than when kept in the pantry or other warm places.
