Treat Wooden Silo

A thorough treatment with coal-tar creosote will make a wooden silo in Oregon more resistant to decay and less subject to shrink-

ing and swelling. If the proper care is taken the silage will not be affected by the creosote, finds the experiment station.

Alfalfa Seed Scarce

Alfalfa seed for planting next spring may be scarce as there was a short crop of seed in the northwest the past summer. Names of men having certified seed to sell may be had by writing to the farm crops department of the college, Corvallis, Oregon.

Grimm Alfalfa Seed Grown

Grimm alfalfa seed has been grown for the first time in considerable quantity this year for certification in Oregon. Fields were inspected and certified in Malheur, Union, Crook, Umatilla, Linn and Dechutes counties, with the principal acreage in Malheur and Crook.

Japanese Clover Not Suited

Japanese clover is not suited to conditions in Oregon for pasture or forage purposes, according to the experiment station tests. It is a fairly successful crop in the southern states, but does not fit into the cold winter conditions in Oregon, or the dry summer months that prevail in most of the state. It does not offer nearly as much promise generally as Ladino clover.

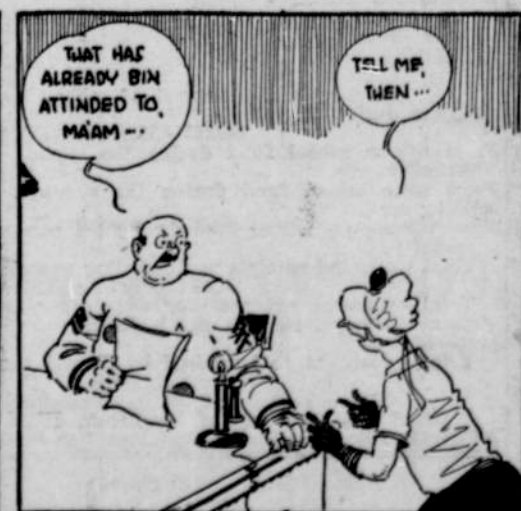
