**Motorist Responsible For Injury To Person Riding In His Car**

"You are responsible for any injury to a person riding in your car provided the injury results because of negligence on your part" stated Meyer Rubin, head of the legal department of the Oregon State Motor association, in commenting on the recent supreme court decision handed down by Judge Rossman.

Since the law, contained in chapter 342 Oregon laws was passed at the 1927 session of the Oregon legislature, the average motorist has believed that he could invite a guest to ride with him without assuming any responsibility for that guest's safety. This, too, was the opinion of the judges, lawyers, in-

urance adjusters and companies and many just claims were refused and suits dismissed because of this legislative enactment.

The supreme court of Oregon does not take this view and last week held this bit of legislation unconstitutional, which means it does not exist, and the guest has the same right he had before 1927.
