BUY IN VERNONIA

Home Pointers

To make peanut brittle porous, add one-fourth teaspoon of soda to two cups of caramelized sugar before the nuts are added.

Corn syrup, cream of tartar, lemon juice, vinegar and acetic acid may be used to help make fudge, penuchi or fondant creamy.

Crystals which have formed on the sides of the saucepan in which candies are cooking may be washed away with cheesecloth wrapped around a fork.

Always lay a glass thermometer on a damp cloth. If laid on a cold slab or table it may break.

Pour candies which are to be cut into a square pan so that all the pieces can be cut the same size.

The meats from pecan nuts may be removed easily and whole by putting the nuts into a pan of water and boiling fifteen minutes.

Very little effort will then bring the kernels out whole. This does not injure the flavor of the nuts. Floured scissors are good for cut-

ting marshmallows and dried fruits such as raisins, dates, etc.

Seeded raisins may be separated easily by washing the whole package under the cold water faucet.

A mixture of flour and sugar dusted over the bottom crust of a pie before adding fruit or other filling prevents the filling from soaking the crust.

New popcorn, or popcorn that is damp, need not be dried out before popping, as is usually done. If you have recently gathered your corn or if it has been left in a damp room, and you wish to use it right away, shell a few ears and put it in a bowl of water for ten minutes. It will pop readily, and the flakes will be crisp and nice.

Tuberculosis Terrible

Tuberculosis in livestock is a deceptive disease. Unlike most other livestock diseases, which cause visible symptoms and arouse immediate alarm among livestock owners, tuberculosis is generally slow in developing and its symptoms are not easily recognized from the appearance of the animals, so many people mistakenly believe that it does comparatively little harm. Early eradication is the most economical way to combat the disease. Have the herd tested, says the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. department of agriculture, and then keep the disease out. Means by which tuberculosis is introduced into a healthy herd are by adding animals affected with the disease; by feeding calves with unpasteurized milk or other dairy products from tuberculosis cows; by showing cattle at fairs and exhibitions; by shipping animals in cars which have recently carried diseased cattle and which have not been properly disinfected; and by using community pastures. Do not add cattle to your herd unless you know they are from tuberculosis-free herds, or herds under supervision for the eradication of the disease.

Greenhouse Best for Plants

The equipment for growing young plants of various vegetables has become modernized almost as fast as the automobile. A few years ago the manure hothed was used extensively, today small propagating greenhouses are used. There is hardly any question concerning the greater efficiency of the greenhouses for plant-growing not to mention the greater care and comfort in doing of the work. A grower of young plants recently reported that a greenhouse 21 by 25 feet, seven feet high at eaves, 12 feet high at the ridge, and of concrete and pipe frame construction, with hot water system and sawdust burner cost him \$500 for actual material not including labor. Plans for such greenhouses may be obtained from the department of vegetable gardening at Oregon State college.

Rent Additional Land

Many farmers could increase their incomes by renting additional land for next year. It pays to keep machinery and help busy, points out the management department at the experiment station.
