traps or conical traps, placed over holes large enough to attract flies to the light, may be attached to the top of the pit or bin. Watertight floors are desirable in a stable. Dirt or wooden floors enable many fly larvae to migrate from the manure to the soil and develop there. Troughs and mangers should be kept clean, as surprisingly large numbers of flies will breed in small quantities of material in the corners of such places.

**Commission Has Authority**  
A piece of legislation recently passed gives the state game commission authority to seize any boat equipped with a net that is found in a closed stream. This, it is believed will enable the game warden to curb salmon poaching. In the past it has been necessary to catch poachers in the act of taking fish with a net, or to find a net set in a closed stream. Law violators have made no special efforts to hide the fact that they owned net equipment boats, but have defied the commission to catch them using the equipment to illegally fish.

**Oregon Tax Rolls Opened**  
Oregon's 1928 tax rolls opened on March 1. Multnomah county rolls aggregate \$18,289,052 against \$17,853,957 previous year. First day's payments unusually light, at about \$12,300. Under revised law taxpayers have until May 5 to pay first half, and until November 5 to pay second half taxes.

**Oregon to Pay \$2,211,446**  
State of Oregon is prepared to send to fiscal agents in New York by April 1 sum of \$1,614,380 as interest and principal payments on state highway bonds and \$597,066 as interest on Veterans' State Aid bonds. Of larger payment \$362,500 covers principal for retirement of bonds.

**SYSTEM FOR KILLING SQUIRRELS AVAILABLE**  
(By Geo. A. Nelson)  
Ground squirrels are now making their appearance and the most effective control measures are obtained by destroying them at this time of the year. If poison is used for this purpose, they will eat it more readily now than any other time, as there is less feed available. They will also be destroyed before the young litters arrive. A year ago considerable squirrel poison was used early in the season and the most effective results were obtained. Yet there were several hundred pounds less squirrel poison used last year than the year before. If the campaign to control the squirrels is carried on during the early part of the season this year a more effective control would result, and there would probably be even less poison used this year than last. By following systematic control measures each year the number of ground squirrels can be kept down to where there will be little or no loss to crops. A supply of poison grain, mixed according to the government formula, is available at the county agricultural agent's office; also at the various places

## HOME POINTERS

When preparing fresh crabs for the table an unusual flavor may be obtained by cooking them in a gallon of salt water to which has been added one cup of vinegar and whole spices to taste.

Tapioca placed in the bottom of fruit pies will absorb the juices and keep the pie from becoming soggy.

In the preparation of hash something to give a distinct flavor is needed. With veal, add bacon fat; with beef or lamb, liver is best. Liver added to corned beef hash is good.

A different flavor may be given to roast lamb if the meat is pierced in a number of places with a sharp knife and a bit of onion and green chili pepper crowded into each incision, and then roasted as usual or the onion may be rolled in red pepper and the green pepper omitted.

Celery leaves are especially good in dressing to be served with roast veal. Sausage meat adds a spicy flavor and green pepper and parsley are also good in this dressing.

**Trees Help Build Soil**  
Trees help to build soil. When the woods burn, valuable fertilizer is destroyed. Often this is worth as much as \$15 to \$25 an acre.

**Prepare To Fight Flies**  
Fly time will soon be here again, and an ounce of prevention of fly breeding is worth a pound of fly swatters, sticky fly paper, or traps later on. Manure is a favorite breeding place for flies. Inclosing or screening the manure pit or bin is a great help in controlling this pest. Tent
