

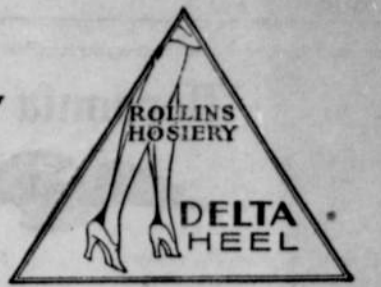

Separate Turkeys and Chickens
To avoid losses of chicks from gapes, keep them away from turkeys; the turkeys may show no signs of the disease, but they can pass it on to chicks with fatal results to the latter. Gapes is caused by a parasitic worm that gets into the chicks' windpipe, and the male and female worms have the curious habit of attaching themselves so firmly to each other that at first sight they look like a single worm with two heads and two necks. It is pretty difficult to extract the worms and it is better to put your faith in prevention. Put the chicks, as soon as hatched, on clean ground, and keep them away from turkeys or ground occupied by turkeys. Adult chickens seem to be immune from gapes.
