Transcript of the essential features of the by-laws of the pioneers of Nehalem valley, as to membership as it now stands as amended at a regular meeting held on the 13th, day of June 1925. Which reads as follows:

Every applicant for membership to this association must have been a Bonified Settler and actual resident of the said Nehalem valley prior to January 1 1888.

The constitution and by-laws of the above mentioned association were adopted at a meeting held at Birkenfeld, Oregon, on the 27th, day of June 1924, and being signed by 35 of the old settlers of the community who are regarded as charter members, since which time there has been numerous additional members taken into the organization so that, at the present date there is about 104 names on the list, not excepting those who have since deceased, being 6 in number.

Officers of the above named association for the current year are as follows: Walter Carl, president; A. M. Berg, vice president; J. O. Libel, secretary treasurer; all of Birkenfeld, Oregon. Time set for the next annual meeting, second Sunday in June, 1930, at the hour of 10 o'clock a.m.

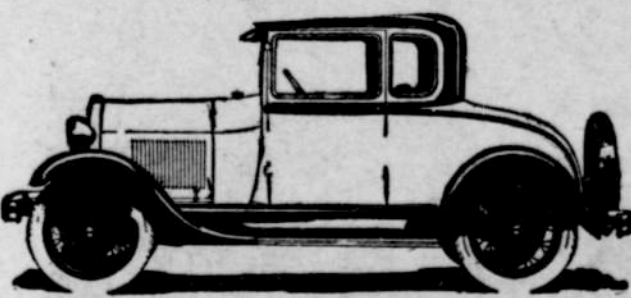
