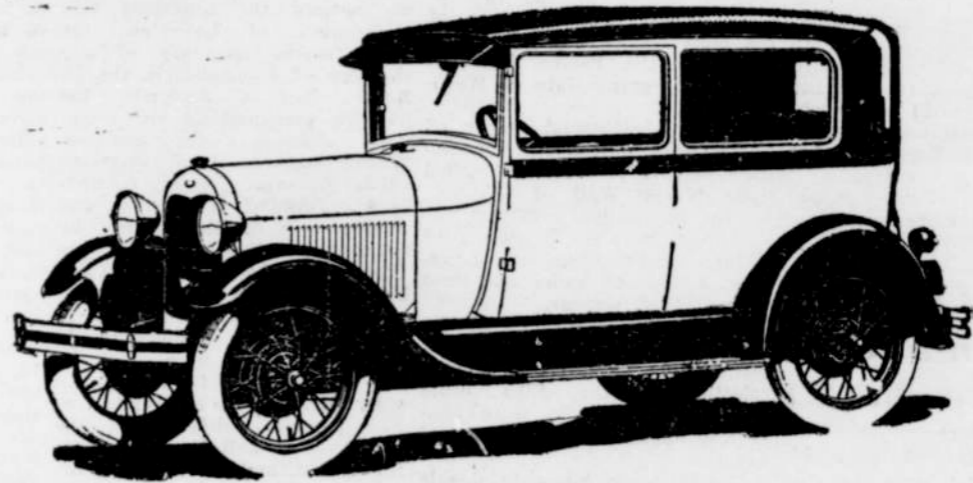

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Kitchen Recitals

- Salted Nuts**
Almonds are usually blanched before salting; most other nuts are not. Heat 1/2 cup of cooking oil in a small frying pan. Put in nuts enough to form a single layer in the pan and stir until they are sufficiently browned. Almonds should be only a light color; others may be darker. Skim out of the fat, spread on absorbent brown paper to drain and salt well. Then do not handle until they are completely cool.
- Brown Sugar Sea Foam**
1 pound brown sugar
1/2 cup water
1 egg-white
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup walnuts
A pinch of salt.
- Boil to soft call stage 240°F. Beat egg-white stiff and pour syrup over it, beat slowly. When beginning to thicken add vanilla and chopped nuts.

- Vegetable Plum Pudding**
2 cups flour
1 pound raisins
1 cup potatoes
1 cup carrots
- 1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1 tablespoon cold water
1 cup suet
2 oranges, juice and grated rind
1 lemon, grated.
Mix flour and raisins. Put potatoes, carrots and suet through the food chopper. Mix soda and water. Combine the mixtures. Then add the remainder of the ingredients. Steam 3 hours in greased mold. Serve with lemon sauce.
- Little Plum Puddings**
Pour 1 cup scalded milk over 1 pint of bread crumbs, taken from the center of a stale loaf of bread; when cool, add 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt and yolks of 4 eggs. One-half pound of suet mixed with one-half pound chopped almonds, one-half pound currants, one-half pound seeded raisins. Add 1/2 teaspoon each of cloves, mace and 1 teaspoon each of cinnamon and nutmeg. Fold in the whites of 4 eggs, beaten stiff. Pour into buttered individual molds and steam 1 hour. This recipe makes 12 little puddings. Serve with hard sauce.
