**CREAM OF TOMATO SOUP**  
1/2 can tomatoes  
1/2 Teaspoon soda  
1 qt. milk  
1 slice onion  
4 tablespoons flour.  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper.  
4 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
Scald milk with onion, remove onion and thicken milk with flour. Cook mixture for twenty minutes in a double boiler stirring constantly at first. Cook tomatoes with sugar fifteen minutes, add soda and rub through a sieve, combine mixtures, add butter, salt and pepper.

**FAIRY GINGERBREAD**  
1/2 cup butter  
1 cup light brown sugar  
3/4 cup milk  
1 7-8 cups bread flour  
2 teaspoons ginger  
2 teaspoons ginger  
Cream the butter, add sugar gradually and milk very slowly. Mix and sift flour and ginger and combine mixtures. Spread very thinly with a broad, long bladed knife on a buttered, inverted dripping pan. Watch carefully and turn pan frequently during baking that all may be evenly cooked. If mixture around edge of pan is cooked before that in the center, pan should be removed from oven, cooked part cut off and remainder returned to oven.

**BERKSHIRE SOUP**  
1 onion, finely chopped  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 bay leaf  
12 peppercorns  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 can tomatoes  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon pepper  
2 cups of water  
1 can corn  
1-2 cup cream  
2 egg yolks.  
Cook onion in butter five minutes. Add bay leaf, peppercorns and flour and cook twenty minutes, then add tomatoes, sugar, salt pepper and boiling water and simmer twenty minutes. Add corn, cook ten minutes and force through a strainer. Just before serving add egg yolks diluted with cream.

**ROAST WILD DUCK**  
Dress, clean and truss the same as goose. Place on a rack in dripping pan, sprinkle with salt and pepper and cover breast with very thin slices of fat salt pork. Bake twenty or thirty minutes in a very hot oven, basting every five minutes with fat in pan, cut string and remove string and skewers. Serve with an orange or olive sauce. Currant jelly should accompany the duck course. Domestic ducks should always be well cooked, requiring little more than twice the time allowed for wild ducks.

**MONTE CARLO SALAD**  
Remove pulp from four large grapefruit and drain. Add an equal quantity of finely cut celery and apple cut in small pieces. Moisten with mayonnaise around a border of lettuce leaves and mask with mayonnaise. Outline using green mayonnaise four oblongs to represent playing cards and denote spots on cards by canned pimientos or truffles; melted pimientos cut in shapes of
