Gigantic Fokker Is Fuelled With Richfield Oil On Cross-Country Air Trips

Los Angeles, April 17—Six thousand, six hundred and seventy gallons of Richfield gasoline were required to bring the pair of gigantic Fokker F-32 passenger planes of the Western Air express from New York to Los Angeles, according to figures just released here by the Richfield Oil company. Each of the huge liners averaged about 115 gallons of fuel per hour and their total flying time was approximately 29 hours, it was disclosed. The airplanes made an average speed of 110 miles per hour. Their total mileage was 2980 apiece.

Are your hotels and restaurants using poisonous silver polish?

Numerous outbreaks of acute food poisoning of obscure origin have recently been attributed to the use of certain commercial silver polishes widely used in hotels and restaurants. This material was found to contain large quantities of sodium cyanide, some of which remained on the silverware, unless it was thoroughly rinsed. Individual using it were apparently subjected to severe attacks of gastro-enteritis with vomiting, abdominal cramps, extreme prostration and diarrhea.

In May, 1928, a family at a large hotel in Atlantic City was stricken with acute stomach and intestinal pain at which hotel they were using cyanide polish. In June, 1928, about 30 persons attending a convention dinner at a leading hotel in Utica, N. Y., became acutely ill several hours following a meal. An investigation by the New York state health department led to the discovery that the poisoning was due to cyanide silver polish. All of these cases resembled acute food poisoning.

The chemical analysis of the silver polish showed one of the ingredients to be sodium cyanide to the extent of 20.54 per cent. The label on the silver polish read, "In daily use in leading hotels, clubs and restaurants, etc.," and in contrast with the label on the container of a hotel polish by another manufacturer read, "Contains no cyanide or lye."

Widely separated groups of cases of acute stomach and intestinal disturbances have occurred and have been traced to the use of cyanide silver polish. With the removal of the silver polish in question from hotel pantries and restaurants there has been a cessation of such complaints.

Poisonous substances for polishing kitchenware or silverware should be prohibited. Any polish or article or substance containing any cyanide preparation, or other poison should not be used in any hotel, club, restaurant or public eating place for the cleansing of nickel, copper, silverware or silver-plated ware or other articles or utensils used for the service or preparation of food.

HOME POINTERS

From the school of home economics, O. S. C. The surest way to get the family to eat vegetables is to make them look so good that they can't be resisted. When making lemon, chocolate or other one-crust pies where cornstarch or flour is used in the filling, mixing the cornstarch or flour will often keep the mixture from lumping. When making sugar syrup from either brown or white sugar, the addition of four table-spoons of corn syrup to a pint of sugar syrup will often prevent its turning to sugar. Junket is very easily made, and since it is milk in a solid form it makes a pleasing way of incorporating milk into the diet.

Pasture for Hogs

The value of good pasture for hogs can not be overestimated. Rye, oats, wheat, rape, soybeans, and cowpeas are all good temporary pastures. Sweet clover is also satisfactory. Rape may be sown with oats in the spring. Cowpeas and soybeans make a good mixture. Seeding for temporary pastures should be heavier than for a grain crop. Many successful hog growers put a
