Write your story now, telling why more dairy products should be used for the health of the public and why greater prosperity to the dairymen adds greater prosperity to the entire community. Tell your own story in your own words. There are no rules as to how long a story you should write, but it should be of proper length to include the facts and to be of interest to most readers.

Material in regard to the value of dairy products may be obtained by writing to the county agent's office, at St. Helens. Send your essay to Mrs. Edith L. Sheets, lecturer Pomona Grange, Clatskanie, Oregon. Do not sign the essay, but write your name and address on a separate slip of paper and attach it, as the essay will be given a number which to identify it at the time of judging.

Judging will be done on the following basis: Best arguments put forth in favor of using more dairy products from an economic and health standpoint, 60 points; English construction, 25 points; Neatness 10 points; Spelling 5 points; Total 100 points.
