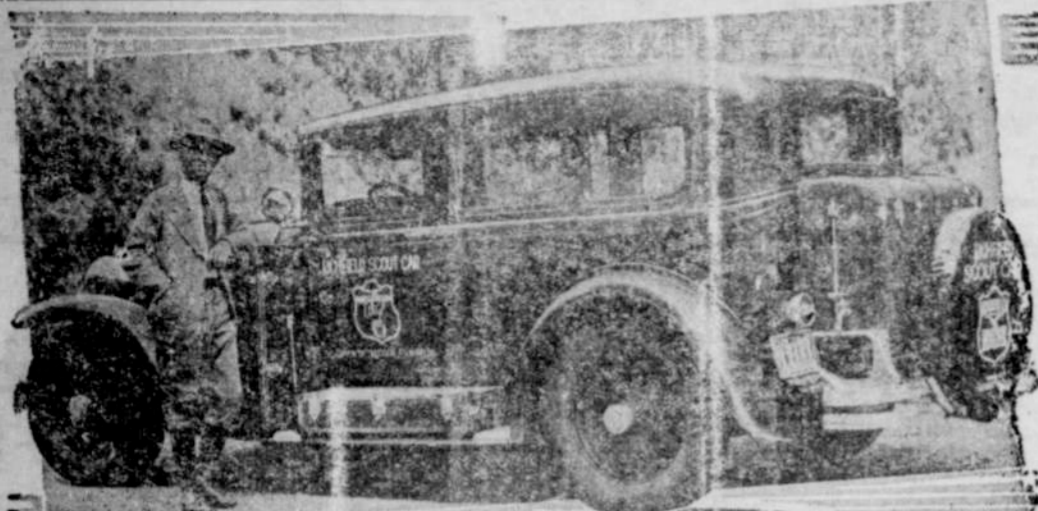


Famous Outdoor Scout and Car Here
