

Water is Scarce on Route Taken by Hoffman Family Through the West and South

Not how many miles to a gallon of gas, but how many miles on five gallons of water was what worried C. S. Hoffman on his recent tour of Idaho, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, Mexico and California.

Even in the desert, though, where water had to be carted for miles, it was free—except when he or his family wanted some fit to drink; then it was frequently five cents a glass, and worth it. Only once did Mr. Hoffman have to buy water for his radiator.

Hot it was too—120 degrees in the shade of a canvas at one point. The radiator cap could not be touched with bare hands, and even the oil gauge plunger was so scorching that Mr. Hoffman had to drop it once when he took hold of it.

Gas, like water had to come a long way, and once, at the Grand Canyon, he had to pay 50 cents for it. It had to be hauled there for 175 miles—and the railroad only 8 miles away! But between was the impassable canyon, and the gas had to come from a distance.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman visited Cedar Brakes, Utah, Diamond

peak, Brice park, the Grand Canyon, and the Yosemite.

They took a short trip to Tia Juana, Mexico, and considered the place very ordinary—scarcely Mexican, kept up mostly by adventurers from Los Angeles. Mr. Hoffman had heard about rigid inspection of baggage for liquor smuggling into the United States. To avoid the expense of checking the family belongings at the border on the trip in he ran the risk—and when his turn came to leave Mexico he was waved ahead with scarcely a glance. So much for a sober bearing and an honest countenance! Suspected imbibers had no such luck.

The highest place they reached was Cedar Brakes, 10,000 feet; the lowest was 5 feet below sea level, in the Mojave desert.

A cousin of Mr. Hoffman, R. F. Walters, is chief engineer at Boulder Dam, and through his courtesy the party saw all that huge reclamation project.

The trip totaled 4,200 miles, and took a month. With Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman were their daughters Alice and Catherine.
