Astoria BUDGET: Census figures just released show tilled acres in Clatsop county jumped from 6624 in 1920 to 12,830 in 1930; assessed valuation more than doubled, increasing from \$438,035 to \$934,360. Dairy animals increased from 4800 to 6450 but with a greater increase in production per cow.
