LOWER COLUMBIA CAMPS RESUMING

The lumber industry which has been pretty quiet in this community this summer will partially open up the first of the week according to reports.

Benson Timber company is re-opening next week. The men will go into the woods Monday afternoon and start work on Tuesday morning. They will operate full force with about 210 men going into the woods.

Benson Timber company has been closed since June 20th, when they ceased operations for the annual July 4th shutdown.

Tideport Lumber company will also start operating the first of the week but with two sides according to reports. Men have been in the woods for the past two weeks getting ready for the opening. Tideport runs four and five sides when under normal conditions.

Big Creek will probably not resume operations until the first of October although it is possible they may start the middle of September if conditions take a change for the better.

The Clarke and Wilson Lumber company has been operating since the eighteenth of July but only about half force. They are operating five sides while under normal conditions they run ten or twelve.

The Westport Lumber company will continue to run one shift as in the past and the Crossett Western company at Wauna which has been shut down for some time will not begin work until the fifteenth of September at least, according to W. S. Morrow, sales manager, and he adds that whether they start then depends largely on some improvement in the lumber market in the meantime.—Clatskanie Chief.
