A. A. Schwab spent Saturday in Vernonia on business.

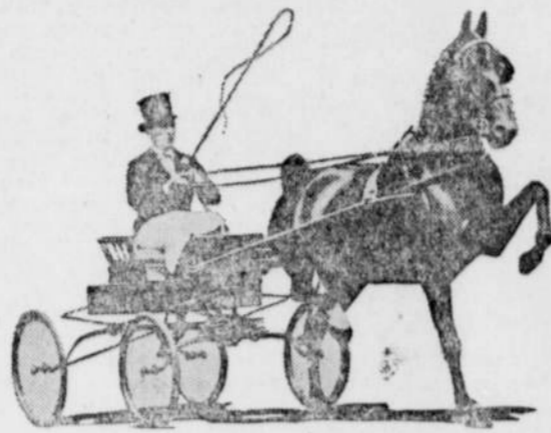

DAIRY OUTLOOK BETTER

Prices of dair products have the reduction in milk production through the drouth area, making the short-time market outlook better in this industry, reports L. R. Breithaupt, extension economist at Oregon State college.

From a long-time standpoint, however, dairymen are still carrying too many old and poor cows in their herds, according to government reports, Breithaupt finds. The average price for milk cows has now declined to such an extent that increased culling may be approaching.
