## JOHANSSON GAGE BLOCKS ARE MARVELS OF SCIENCE

How long is an inch?  
 A carpenter answers the question with the simple statement that it is one-twelfth of a foot. The mathematician instantly pictures a theoretical division in space, having only one dimension—length. But, put the question to J. E. Kerr, of Kerr Motor Co., local Ford dealer, and he will write the Johansson gage blocks.

These gage blocks, little ob- longs of shining metal, are the world's most sensitive measuring instruments—so sensitive that the heat from one's hand expands them in but five seconds. Their use in the plants of the Ford Motor company, Mr. Kerr says, makes possible the amazing precision with which parts for the Ford car are manufactured in volume production.

A master set of the gages comprises eighty-one blocks, each of a different size. From these 81 pieces, blocks can be com- bined to measure 120,000 differ- ent lengths in consecutive steps of one ten-thousandth part of an inch.

Mr. Kerr said there are more than seventy forgings on the Ford car.

"A trip through the Ford plant will reveal hundreds of the most careful inspections and measure- ments of parts in production," Mr. Kerr said. "Each of the parts must be accurate to within an infinite decimal fraction part of an inch, and, to insure that they are, they are tested by various kinds of gages.

"But these gages themselves must first be accurate, or at least so nearly accurate that they would detect a difference that is equal to but a fifteenth of the diameter of a human hair. Constant use wears them down. The wear may be just a ten thousandth of an inch, but never- theless that rules them out for use in the Ford plants.

"So the working gages which the workmen use in the plants are checked periodically with the Johansson blocks and re-adjusted. Because of the sensitive reaction of the Johansson blocks to heat and cold, these tests are conducted in rooms in which the temperature is kept at 68 degrees."
