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two routes that have proved their superior advantages and have been endorsed by general popular consent. These are the original Wilson-river route which gives the people of Tillamook the service to which they are entitled, and the Scappoose-Vernonia-Hamlet route which makes thrifty use of roads already built, opens up an isolated section and distributes traffic to the northern beaches. "Both these roads should be built—and work should be started on them at once. Hundreds of the unemployed and thousands among their distressed and anxious families are desperately hanging on the hope that this road-building program will give work and wages to carry them through the threatening winter. Every day's delay further exhausts their vanishing resources and aggravates their growing impatience. "Preliminary plans for organizing the work to give the largest amount of employment to the greatest number of most deserving men should have been long since completed. Actual construction should now be under way. Every day's postponement means not only a loss of good road-making weather but of the pair of shoes that some child should be wearing to school or the nourishing food that someone needs today if he is to be ready for work tomorrow. "We emphatically urge the state highway commission to order the building of the Wilson river and Vernonia-Hamlet highways and to see that construction begins immediately."

PASTURE MIXTURE GIVEN FOR HILL LAND SEEDING

With considerable brush and stump land burned over this summer, particularly in western and southern Oregon, many dairymen and stockmen are planning on sowing such burned-over lands to pasture, sowing the seed early in the ashes.

establishing such pastures, regardless of their location, are given by G. R. Hyslop, chief in farm crops at the Oregon Experiment station, in response to many inquiries.

First, says Mr. Hyslop, the seed mixture must not be too expensive, even at the sacrifice of some grasses that might be a little better than some whose seed is more reasonably priced. Fortunately for the buyer grass seeds of all kinds are much lower in price than usual this year.

A second important feature is to make sure that such mixtures are free from perennial weeds and that the grass seed is

good, high-testing material free from salvaged seed or screenings sometimes included in pasture mixtures.

A final requirement given by Mr. Hyslop is that the mixture contain two or three good sod forming grasses such as red top and Kentucky bluegrass to insure the sod forming qualities so necessary to permanence in such a pasture.

A complete mixture that meets these requirements for western and southern Oregon, including the coast hill lands, is as follows:

Rye grass 5lb.
Orchard grass 3lb.
Tall oat grass 3lb.

Kentucky bluegrass 2lb.
Red top 1lb.
Chewing fescue 2lb.
White or Ladino clover 1lb.
Alsike clover 1lb.
Burr clover 3lb.
