NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of Union High School District No. 1, of Columbia County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at school building on the 17th day of October, 1931, at 2:00 to 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 30, 1931, and ending June 30, 1932, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.
