Mr. and Mrs. Archie Lizenby of Vernonia were visitors in camp on Monday calling at the Olson and Charles Mackie home.

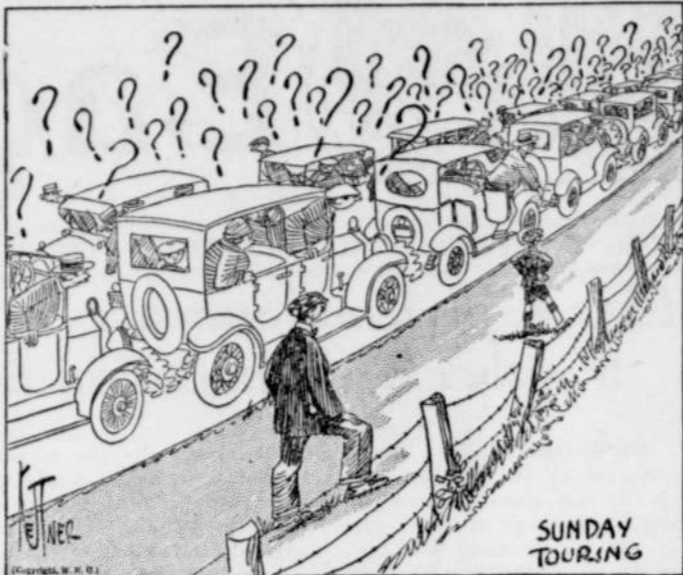
