Sociable Birds

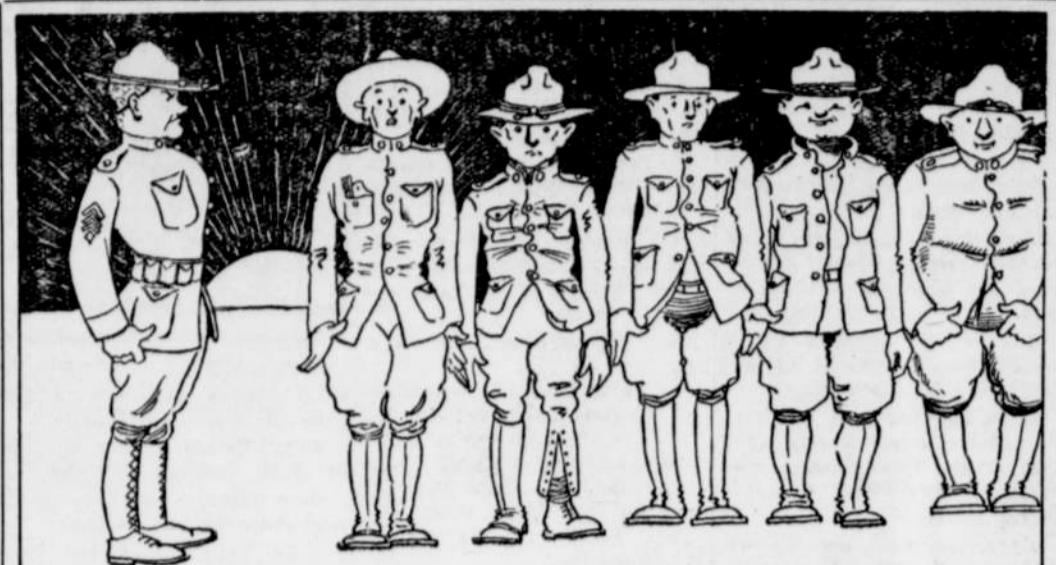
