FARM PRICES SINK LOWER; OUTLOOK REPORTS COMING

Price levels for farm products on Oregon farms average scarcely half as high as at this season of the year from 1926 to 1930, according to data just released by the Oregon State college extension service.

The general level of farm prices for eggs on April 15 was 51 per cent of the average on that date

The exchange value of farm products for commodities usually purchased by farmers now averages about one-half as much as before the war, according to the circular. Factory payrolls in the United States which are listed as a measure of the strength of demand for farm products were reported at 50 per cent of the average at the same season from 1923 to 1925.

built, once it is constructed. We believe this is an instance where in it has paid good dividends to take plenty of time to the chore at hand."

Elsie is the point at which the Scappoose-Vernonia and the Wolf creek routes come together. "By

means of the new route just located and upon which full and complete figures should be available shortly, it will be but 81 miles from Seaside to Portland via Wilf creek and but four or five miles further by the Vernonia route," Chairman Scott continued.

Will Build Cut-Off

"Eventually we would expect to build a cut-off along Cronan creek to Mohler and the Tillamook beaches from Wolf creek road. This cut-off would be 18 miles long.

"Then the road distance to Barview would be the same via either Wolf creek or the Wilson river road."

The new survey, it is noted by Chairman Scott, will serve both the Wolf creek and Vernonia-Scappoose routes, through Elsie.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

CREAM PUFFS

1 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup butter
4 eggs

Add salt and butter to boiling water. Stir in flour at once and keep stirring until mixture leaves side of pan. Remove from fire, add unbeaten eggs, one at a time, beating constantly. Drop by spoonfuls in buttered pan. When baked cut with sharp knife, then fill with whipped cream or custard. —Mrs. J. W. Neurer.
