Lumberjacks from all corners of the Northwest will rally at Longview July 2 and 4, there to vie in Longview's beautiful Lake Sacajawea open-air, natural amphitheater in all manner of spectacular woodsmen's contests. These scenes, snapped at Rolleos of past years, are typical of those which will be witnessed in Longview during the forthcoming celebration. At the top, left, are husky log buckers sawing against time for the log-bucking championship, and at the right, Pete Hooper, log rolling champ of 1931, just as he dumped an opponent in the lake. At the left, you see a high-climber in the midst of a thrilling 150-foot descent down a towering spar tree.
