County Deposits Safe

Deposits of Columbia county in the bank are amply protected by state and school district bonds, according to County Treasurer Gladys Peterson. Approximately \$11,000 was on deposit, about \$6500 of this being from the bond sinking fund. The bonds held by the treasurer amount to considerably more than the total of the deposits.

City Loses

About \$12,000 in sinking fund on hand for purchase of city bonds was on deposit at the time of the crash, according to Recorder C. F. Hieber.

No deposits were made the morning of the bank's failure, states Loel Roberts, cashier.

Much Color Blindness Found in Middle West

Complete color blindness may be rare, as science says, but the navy has discovered that even partial inability to distinguish colors is quite a handicap to seafaring life. Not long ago a ship's commander ran his vessel aground because he could not distinguish a red light from a white one. Though no great damage was done resultant inquiry revealed a real menace to color-blind navigation. So the Annapolis authorities are now very strict.

It is interesting that the Naval academy finds that most of its color-blind applicants come from the Middle West. The explanation is that this section of the country, being generally flat, is devoid of the marked colorings of the East and West and its residents have gradually lost their ability to distinguish colors. Advent of traffic signal lights is helping overcome nature's neutrality in this section to some extent, but the fact remains that the Middle West is markedly color blind. Which reminds us of the case of a Washington woman, the wife of an air service officer, who, though color blind, drives her own car about the capital. Her system is unique. She knows the location of the red, yellow and green lights in the traffic signals, and can govern her movements accordingly.—Pathfinder Magazine.

Protested War of 1812

The Hartford convention was a convention of delegates from the New England states to protest against the continued prosecution of the War of 1812. It met at Hartford, Conn., December 15, 1814, and sat for about three weeks. George Cabot of Massachusetts was chosen president. New England was known to be out of sympathy with the War of 1812, as it interfered with overseas trade. While stories circulated to the effect that the convention planned to turn New England back to the British crown to be made a duchy, the actual proposals were milder. They included a demand that each state of the Union be permitted to defend itself, having taxes partially remitted for that purpose. Seven amendments to the Constitution were proposed. The war having ended about this time, nothing came of the proposals.
