KOAC NOW ON FULL TIME

WITH BROADER PROGRAMS

A 12-hour schedule daily except Sunday has been resumed by KOAC, the Oregon State college radio station, which on July 1 began a series of programs which will include lectures, music and other talent from not only the college but from University of Oregon, and Oregon Normal school as well.

Control of the station was recently placed under the general extension service headed by Dean Alfred Powers of Eugene. Studios for this year at least will be maintained only at Corvallis as lack of funds have prevented contemplated remote control connections with other campuses at Salem.

Under the new organization a much broader list of program offerings is made possible by bringing specialists to the studios from Eugene, Monmouth and the Portland extension center. The farm and homemaker features as well as other offerings from the State college will be continued as formerly. W. L. Kadderly, program director for several years, continues as manager of operations and programs and head of the radio department of the general extension division.

Certified Seed Potatoes Marketed Says Geo. Nelson

"Certified seed potatoes grown in Columbia county have practically all been marketed at the present time, at prices ranging from 85 cents to \$1.25 per sack, with only one lot going under this figure," states County Agent George A. Nelson. "Certified seed potatoes gave a fair return to market demands for most crops. A total of 110 acres of certified seed was grown in Columbia county last year."

Seed potatoes grown here are of high quality and in demand in other parts of the country, Nelson indicated. The Oregon coast district and California provide the principal market outlets, California taking the bulk of the local crop.

There is much land in Columbia county, Nelson points out, that is well adapted to growing high quality potato seed and it is one crop that has returned a profit in most years. The development of this potato seed business has taken place in the last few years by growers cooperating with the county agent's office, through which a certification service is provided. The service includes two field inspections to examine the fields for the presence of virus diseases of potatoes and a bin inspection as well as a sealing and tagging service when the potatoes are ready to sell.
