NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District Union High No. 1, of Columbia County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at high school building, on the 5th day of November, 1932, at 2 to 7 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 27, 1932, and ending June 26, 1933, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.

When the budget meeting is held in connection with the annual school meeting, the following provision of section 232, School Laws 1929, should be observed: "Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon any matters before the meeting."
