Question of Increasing Tax Levy
Over Amount Limited by Section
11, Article XI, State Constitution.

Notice is hereby given that an
election will be held in School
District No. 47 of Columbia
County, State of Oregon, at the
Washington school in said dis-
trict, on the 14th day Novem-
ber, 1932, at 8:00 p. m., for the
purpose of submitting to the legal
voters of said district the question
of increasing the tax levy for the
year 1933-34 over the amount
limited by section 11, article XI,
of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such
levy are: Due to a clerical error,
several years ago, the clerk of
this district submitted the bud-
get to the County Assessor several
thousand dollars lower than it
had actually been voted. This er-
ror has lowered the base of this
district to the extent that it will
be necessary to vote in excess
to the 6 per cent limitation in
order to carry on the school.

The amount of special tax
proposed to be levied for said
year is \$39,372.90.
