**TO THE VOTERS OF COLUMBIA COUNTY**

During the time I have been your DISTRICT ATTORNEY there has been COLLECTED as fines and forfeitures and PAID into the Public Treasury over \$142,000.00, or an average of \$1,000 per month, for the relief of the TAX BURDEN.

During the past four years I have prosecuted, in the different courts of the county, more than 700 criminal cases; of this number over 94 per cent resulted in convictions.

Of those prosecuted during the past four years for violation of the Liquor Laws more than 95 per cent have been found guilty.

An important duty of this office consists of advising the County Court and other County Offices in the administration of County affairs. The advice so given during my term of office has resulted in avoiding costly litigation involving the County, and I feel that experience gained during nearly twelve years of service is a valuable asset to the people of Columbia county.

My opponent, Mr. Storla, complains because the county furnishes me with an office in the Court House and while he does not so state, he leaves the inference that this will not be necessary if he is elected to the position which I now hold. I have maintained my office in the Court House at the request of the members of the County Court who feel that the advisor of the County should at all times be accessible to those requiring his services. I heartily concur with the judgment of the Court in this respect.

Mr. Storla, in his first letters to the public, boldly stated that the taxpayers of Columbia county paid a stenographer to do my private law work. In his latest communications he does not so state. If he has discovered that his first statement was erroneous would it not have been only fair to have fully investigated the facts before making any statement regarding it? THE TAXPAYERS DO NOT PAY A STENOGRAPHER FOR DOING MY PRIVATE WORK.

Mr. Storla, for several years, acted as Justice of the Peace at St. Helens and many cases were filed in that Court, a large portion of which were criminal cases tried under the advice and direction of myself as District Attorney. This is a position for which the law does not require or expect legal training as the work is largely clerical.

There will be few readers of this letter who have not at some time during my term of office been obliged to write this office concerning some phase of county or state affairs and this necessarily means that thousands of letters must be answered by the District Attorney. I do not believe that the intelligent voter expects his District Attorney to devote his time to typing letters and long and detailed legal opinions. People are becoming tired
