The bookkeeping class is studying "Closing the Ledger."

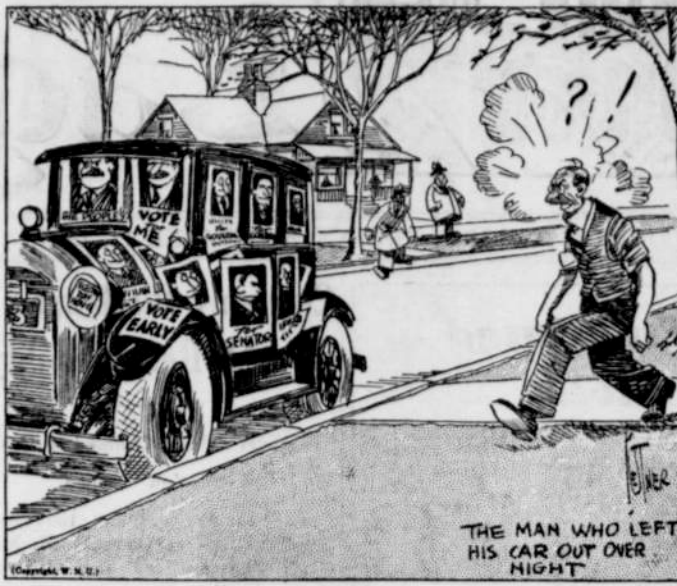
The French II class is studying reflexive pronouns.

These ringing words were spoken emphatically by Miss Aldrich, a representative of the department of motion pictures, as

a major argument in her denunciation of the "wet" movement in the United States, when she gave a talk on prohibition before the assembled student body of Vernonia high school last Wednesday, November 2, in the high school auditorium.

Miss Aldrich pointed out that alcohol affected the human brain strangely, attacking the will centers, the knowledge centers, the heart centers, the lung centers, and the locomotion centers in the order named. Her interesting explanations and examples of alcohol on the brain held the undivided attention of the students.

The speaker then touched lightly the effect of liquor on increase in automobile accidents, stressing the example of the increase of accidents in Canada since the repeal of prohibition in that dominion.

The fact that alcohol aids in the installation of disease in the human body was also stressed by Miss Aldrich.

"Work for the rolling up of an enormous 'No' on 313," Miss Aldrich told the students as a concluding statement.

VERNONIA TEAM BOWS TO BANKS ELEVEN IN LAST GAME OF YEAR

An enraged Banks football team, angered by last year's defeat at the hands of Vernonia, last Saturday, November 5, "turned the tables" on that eleven by defeating them 19-0 on the slippery, muddy field at Banks. This game was the last of the season for Vernonia.

The Banks eleven started out with a bang in the first quarter, scoring their first touchdown within a few minutes of the opening whistle. They failed to convert. The score was made on a wide end run, the Vernonia boys failing to stop the interference. Before Vernonia awakened to the fact, the Banks team again had the oval over. They again failed to convert, putting the score at 12 to 0 in their favor.

Vernonia tightened after this and made considerable yardage but was unable to summon the necessary "push" to put the ball over.

Banks was penalized repeatedly for "offside" and "holding" while the Vernonia eleven did not receive any penalty whatever.

The score at the half was 10 to 0 in Banks' favor.

Early in the third quarter a Banks man caught a Vernonia punt on about his own 45-yard line and with a run of 55 yards put the ball over for the last score of the game. Banks converted making the score 19 to 0, at which numbers it remained.
