Several Measures Approved Vernonia voters approved all of the measures referred to the people by the legislative assembly—the taxpayer voting amendment, the amendment authorizing criminal trials without jury by consent of the accused, and the six per cent tax limitation amendment. Also approved were the initiative measure to repeal the state prohibition law, and the state water power and hydroelectric constitutional amendment. Disapproved, however, were all of the measures upon which the referendum had been invoked, the oleomargarine tax bill, the bill prohibiting commercial fishing in the Rogue river, and the higher
