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### Fight on Sales Tax Is Approved By Grange Session

Without a dissenting voice the 516 delegates to the Oregon State grange convention went on record commending the state master, Ray W. Gill, and the members of the executive committee for their gallant fight against the sales tax. In an open meeting before the convention last evening, Rufus Holman assured the audience that the sales tax was not necessary to keep the ship of state upon an even keel.

"I see no justification for a sales tax," stated the state treasurer, "or for any such tax as is proposed, even if I expect criticism from the reactionary newspapers of the state, but I am used to it."

A resolution that will cause an initiative measure to appear on the ballot in 1934, to create a state banking system, was an important action of the delegates yesterday. At the 1932 session of the order the executive committee was instructed to appoint a committee to draft such a bill and present it to the legislature. Senator Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county, Morton Tompkins of Dayton and Dr. A. Slaughter of Portland were named on this committee.

Members of the legislature who wish to succeed themselves, will, in the future, have their past votes scrutinized, for a resolution was adopted instructing the official publication of the grange to publish the votes of such candidates before coming elections.

Oregon grangers would like to see Uncle Sam exercise his constitutional right of issuing currency and would also have congress extend the postal savings banks into general banking depositories. Resolutions to this end were also adopted.
