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Production Curb On Lumber NearsCHAS. W. MYERS

Operation of the national industrial recovery act will affect no industry more vitally than the lumber industry. That fact is generally recognized by lumber manufacturers of the north Pacific coast region. They have been among the first to formulate fair competition codes and to consider plans for functioning under the act.

It appears to be pretty well impressed upon them that one of the main objectives of the act is to provide employment at wages to which labor is justly entitled and to limit the hours of work so as to employ as many men as possible.

Production Control Essential
In order to spread employment, not only in the community but throughout the producing region, it is necessary to control production so that the mills in the various districts can receive their just share of the business offered. Without control of production employment might be restricted to certain favored communities.

For example, large mills in a main producing center will be regulated as to operating schedules in order to permit smaller mills in more isolated communities to operate and provide employment. The more work is spread out under a fair scale of wages the more general the buying power of the workers will become. The more there is of steady work at commensurate pay in all districts the sooner will be a revival of general trade and industry. That is the ultimate aim of this revolutionary piece of legislation.

Severe Penalties Provided
Production control is a very necessary provision of the act. Operators who have run their plants in the past when it would have benefited the state and the industry most to control their production, now will have occasion to readjust their ideas of operation, although it may be against their will. The act states specifically what is required of the industry and severe penalties for any infraction of the regulations are provided.

Another feature that has been the subject of some speculation is the matter of financing. The opinion is held that there will be a readjustment of banking policies in connection with the lumber industry. It is expected that those banks and financing concerns that have been the virtual czars of numerous lumbering operations are to feel the stern hand of the government in the future.

Large creditors, who in the past frequently commanded their clients to operate, regardless of market conditions, to hasten collections on loans, doubtless will be held in check. Forced operations of this kind in former years have resulted in glutting the market, with a demoralizing effect on prices. Corrective steps along this line will be necessary, it is apparent, to stabilize production and marketing.

in the lumber industry in Oregon and Washington has been the unbridled activity of the small mill operator and portable mill owner. These operators have been accused of continually selling their product below cost of production, even during normal times. Many have been charged with producing inferior grades of lumber and of paying "starvation" wages. However, some of the large operators have been the subject of censure for the same reason.

It may be said of the small operators, on the other hand, that they undoubtedly have been an aid to various communities in providing work during the depression. Men long out of employment were found eager to work even for a mere pittance. Yet, despite the scant wages paid, these operators have continued to operate at a loss.

It is expected that these operators will be subjected to rigid regulation under the recovery act. In the long run, those that survive will be much better off than they ever have been. Holding them in check, along with their big brothers, means a stabilizing influence on the industry.
