system, and to expedite criminal trials.

The debt and taxation limitations for municipal corporation constitutional amendment requires a two-thirds vote for municipal corporations to issue bonds with certain exceptions and provides for legislative limitations on their powers of taxation and indebtedness. The purpose is to restrict future tax levies and to help in preventing municipal extravagance and the incurring of unnecessary bonded indebtedness. The amendment is opposed by the Oregon State Grange on the ground that its terms would make it practically impossible for any municipality, district or other subdivision of the state to issue bonds for any purpose, since one-third of the voters could defeat any proposed bond issue.

The state power fund bonding measure provides for the issuing of \$103,779.45 of general obligation 5 per cent bonds to provide money for the state power fund.

The sales tax bill imposes a tax of two per cent on gross income from sales or exchanges of tangible personal property or service, except for certain sales to dealers for resale at three-tenths per cent, and certain exemptions.

A measure proposed by initiative petition is for the repeal of the prohibition amendment to the state constitution.

The last to appear on the ballot levies a tax of 4 cents per pound on oleomargarine sold in the state.
