VALUE OF WHOLE WHEAT FEATURED BY COUNTY HOME EC. SERVICE

The value of whole wheat as a food is being featured by the Home Economics extension service. Mrs. Sarah V. Case is holding a county-wide project on low cost meals and is featuring this valuable food not only as a breakfast food but to be used for the other two meals.

Whole wheat grains may be purchased at any food store, and to clean it at home add considerable water and stir. Most of the chaff and impurities will rise to the top. Pour these off in a strainer. If one does not have a grinder the ordinary food chopper may be used by cooking the wheat slowly for half an hour and then putting it through the food chopper. The results will be a sharply cut cereal, but is, nevertheless, very palatable and useable as cracked wheat. In the first of the series on low cost meals, Mrs. Case is making wheat outlets as a breakfast food using the following recipe:

Cook cracked wheat over night in a fireless cooker or simmer slowly for three hours. Let stand in a baking pan overnight to mold. When ready to use loosen from sides of pan and invert the loaf. Slice with a sharp knife into 1-3 inch slices. Prepare batter, using 1-2 cup milk to two beaten eggs and 1-8 teaspoon salt. Heat butter, bacon fat or other fat in frying pan. Dip slices of cracked wheat in batter, then in bread crumbs, cornmeal or cracked crumbs, and fry until light brown in color. Rolling in crumbs or meal may be omitted.

Woman Was Originator of Father's Day Observance

Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Wash., was the originator of Father's day. She began her movement back in 1910, as a tribute to her own father, William J. Smart, a G. A. R. veteran, who had reared his own motherless group alone. Mrs. Dodd drew up a petition addressed to the ministerial association of her home city urging such constructive teaching from the pulpit as would point out the importance of a father's place in the home.

Newspapers helped to launch the movement but did not treat the subject seriously. Congressman J. Hampton Moore of Pennsylvania and later Congressman Snell of New York introduced resolutions in congress to set aside a Father's day for a national observance, but nothing came of their efforts.

Then the National Greeting Card association and the tobacco dealers of the nation came to the rescue. Their efforts made Father's day—the third Sunday in June—a day of nationwide observance.
