ALBERT WOOD GETS WORD OF BILL AMENDING LAW ON ROUTE CONTRACTS

Albert Wood, has been advocating for a number of years amendment of the postal laws with respect to cancellation of star route mail contracts, has received word that a bill incorporating the changes he suggested was introduced in Congress March 23 by Representative Chas. H. Martin.

The bill states that when extensions of service on mail routes under contract are ordered pro rata additional pay shall be given, and that no contract shall be canceled solely by reason of such extension. The existing law stipulates that additional pay shall not be in excess of pro-rata, but in practice the post office department often made it less than pro-rata and in some cases canceled the entire contract. Mr. Wood, who was a star route contractor several years ago, has repeatedly urged the amendment finally incorporated in the present bill.
