### OREGON'S VISITORS

Classification of the 12,155 tourists who registered their automobiles in entering Oregon during the first four months of 1934 reveals that 215 cars came from the opposite coast of the United States, from the section along the Atlantic seaboard. The mid-western or central states supplied 663 visiting motor vehicles during the same period, according to records of the secretary of state's office.

California, as usual, contributed the largest number of visitors, registering 7,410 cars, Washington second with 2,700, and Idaho, third with 358. From Canada, 258 automobiles were checked, from United States possessions including Alaska, Hawaii, Canal Zone and the Philippines, 24 were listed, France sent two, and Haiti and Mexico each one. The mountain states, exclusive of Idaho, totaled 523.

The following percentages show the proportion of cars from each

section: New England and Central Atlantic, 1.1 per cent; South Atlantic, 0.7 per cent; Central states, 5.5 per cent; Mountain states, 4.3 per cent; Idaho, 3.4 per cent; California, 61 per cent; Washington, 22 per cent; and United States possessions and foreign countries, including Canada, 312.4 per cent.
