

OREGON'S VISITORS

Classification of the 12,155 tourists who registered their automobiles in entering Oregon during the first four months of 1934 reveals that 215 cars came from the opposite coast of the United States, from the section along the Atlantic seaboard. The midwestern or central states supplied 663 visiting motor vehicles during the same period, according to records of the secretary of state's

California, as usual, contributed the largest number of visitors, registering 7,410 cars, Washington was second with 2,700, and Idaho, third with 358.
