**CARELESSNESS OFFSETS
EXPERIENCE IN DRIVING**

The fatal automobile accident experience of licensed operators with a driving record of a year or more was only 3 per cent better than the average for all drivers combined in 1933. For a driving record of six months to a year, the experience was nearly 13 better, and under three months of driving, 8 per cent better. Thus it is apparent that the drivers who consider themselves really experienced tend to become more careless and consequently more dangerous, it is shown by automobile accident figures.
