Killing of One Deer a Year of Either Sex is Favored

Change of the game laws to permit the killing of one deer a the Masonic temple. year of either sex was recommended at a meeting of the Nehalem Rod and Gun club in the Vernonia Brazing and Machine works office Monday night. The reasons given are that under the present law a hunter may mistake a female for a male deer and kill it. He then walks away and the animal of course does not count on his bag limit. In consequence, the members believed, many female deer needlessly slaughtered.

Change in the elk season to one day around June 1 was also recommended. The meat is then fat and sleek, it was pointed out, while in October there is fire hazard, and the meat is too strong. They recommended the killing one bull elk only a year.

They decided that bears should not be classed as game animals, and advocated an open season the year around.

The recommendations were asked for by the state game com-mission, which will hold a hearing on open and closed seasons and bag limits July 9.
