TRAFFIC ACCIDENT REPEATERS EXAMINED

How many traffic accidents have you had since September 1, 1932?

That type of information is a matter of record in the operator's examination bureau of the office of the secretary of state, P. J. Stadelman, and it has been found that 17.7 per cent of the persons involved in motor accidents are repeaters.

From September 1, 1932, when the bureau took charge of accident reports, to February 1, 1934, 5,077 persons, out of 28,683 reporting, had had previous accident experiences during the same period of time. The bureau "spots" accident repeaters in its files and serious offenders are called in for examinations. Effort is made to determine if there are any weaknesses in driving practices or anything in the individual's attitude towards traffic regulations to cause recurrent difficulties.

In the 5,077 repeaters, the following number of persons had more than one accident in the 17-month period: Two accidents, 4,132; three, 731; four, 158; five,

38; six, 9; seven, 5; eight, 1; nine, 2; and ten, 1.

Drivers licensed as chauffeurs, which include truck and bus drivers, taxicab operators, deliverymen, and others driving for compensation, are the most frequent offenders, due in part to the greater number of miles traveled yearly. However, as an offset to the general chauffeurs' record is the fact that many fleets of trucks and buses through careful supervision and regulation of their drivers, go through long periods of time without any accident records appearing against their employees. One Oregon company in two million miles of fleet operation has not had a single chargeable accident, indicating the results obtained from concentrated safety work.

The road grader is at work on the Nehalem state highway this week.

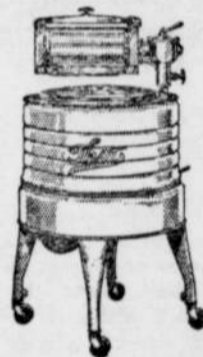
The Colorado Wranglers will play for our next dance at Natal, June 30.
