of year, but a precedent is being established by the present board of directors in combining the budget meeting with the annual meeting. The purpose is to give to the taxpayers the right to pass upon the amounts budgeted for teachers' salaries, school bus allowances and other items legally controllable by the taxpayers. Previously the board made its contracts first, and the taxpayers were bound by the law to pay the amounts called for in the contracts irrespective of the budget allowances. For several years prior to 1933 the budget was voted upon as if a year ahead, but owing to the discovery that the assessor's office did not recognize this dating and levied for the immediate school year the change was made.

### Budget is Lower

The budget for the year 1934-35 calls for a levy of \$12,507.90 lower than that of 1933-34. Owing to a technicality in the law the voters must authorize the directors to exceed the six per cent limitation, in the same manner as if there had been an increase of the levy in excess of six per cent.

The budget committee consisted of Judge W. A. Harris, Judd Greenman and Harry King, together with the three directors of the district, Messrs Aldrich, Knauss and Fisher.

### Stabilization Is Expected from New NRA Pricing Policy

Stabilization of industry and removal of business uncertainty can be expected to result from the new NRA pricing policy which more firmly imbeds into the fundamentals of the NRA policy of "anti-chiseler" price quotations, Joseph J. Wangler of Vernonia, of the Columbia county food and grocery distributors' code authority asserted today in commenting on the effect of the ruling on the largest single NRA code.

The food code, embracing close to 400,000 wholesale and retail grocery establishments doing more than ten billion dollars business protects every member by a provision to insure a return of a part of the labor costs involved under the NRA increases. Mr. Wangler explained that the labor mark-up remains undisturbed as an integral part by the price policy announcement.

"We grocers have fought for years to protect ourselves and our customers from uneconomic competition and also from unnatural restraint of competition. With NRA cooperation the trade is moving toward a rational solution of the price problem," he stated. A. W. Riley, administrator of Division 6, NRA, which includes the food code, states, "NRA announcement of price policy does not amend approved codes. The wholesale food and grocery trade and the retail food and grocery trade code is in full effect as now written and continued compliance with all provisions is required."

### Carl Davidson Makes Brilliant Record at U. of O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon—Carl Davidson, University of Oregon student from Vernonia has sufficiently proved that application to studies can bring results which are almost unbelievable. Davidson will receive his degree of bachelor of laws, at the age of 38, after making one of the most brilliant records ever achieved in the school of law.

Davidson graduated from high school in 1912 and went to work in a logging camp at Vernonia. He became a surveyor for the logging company, then for a railroad and later became a civil engineer. After several years of engineering he decided to take up law. He attended a year at George Washington university, before entering the university. He entered the university law school as a special student, since he did not do work required in the pre-legal years in college. This meant that under ordinary circumstances he could not receive a degree, although he would be eligible to take the state bar examination and become a lawyer.

He made such a brilliant record that Wayne L. Morse, dean of the law school, recommended that Davidson be granted a degree of bachelor of laws. He was given a rigid examination by a group of faculty members, who unanimously declared his background and general knowledge sufficient, even though he had not taken the formal studies of the first three years. It is believed that Davidson's case is the one of the few in the United States when a degree has been granted without the regular academic work.

Davidson made nearly perfect grades in law school, with an average of 2.75 out of a possible 3 points. Besides his scholastic activities Davidson was one of the most active editors of the Oregon Law Review, took part in law school student activities, and was elected a member of Phi Delta Phi, law fraternity.
