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tion. Also, highland Reed canary grass, zig-zag clover, ladino clover, yellow tree foil, and Harding grass. An interesting feature of the zig-zag clover is that it makes a very satisfactory growth when unestablished and produces its seed under ground.

Professor Hyslop discussed the value of putting out good seed in all grass mixtures for pasture and haying a suitable combination for high ground conditions and also a suitable combination of mixture for the grasses for wet and flood lands. The formula for these seed mixtures can be obtained at the county agent's office and arrangements will be made to publish this in the county papers at seeding time next fall.

Mr. Nelson explained that this grass nursery was planted in the fall of 1932 which included at that time about 30 different grasses all of which froze out but about seven in the very severe freeze of that winter. About ten of these were replanted from seed saved over, and several other plantings of African grasses were all frozen out and there was no seed for replanting these.

Professor Hyslop also explained the advantage of seeding western rye grass in about February and March on low ground for producing a crop the same year, it being one of the few grasses that this can be accomplished with. The two grasses than can be planted on over-flow land without any danger of them flooding out is Reed canary grass, which was shown on one of the plots, and meadow fox tail, which is an excellent grass and will stand as much flooding as Reed canary grass and makes an excellent feed. Seaside bent will also stand considerable flooding condition.

On Thursday of last week, a field meeting was held on the Reed canary grass plantings at Clatskanie, some of which had been in for the last eight years
