SHOVEL, AXE AND BUCKET REQUIREMENT ARE NOW EFFECTIVE

A shovel, axe and one-gallon water container must be included in the equipment of campers entering the national forests of Oregon and Washington by pack train, automobile, or other vehicle, if they wish to obtain a campfire permit, according to Regional Forester C. J. Buck, Portland, Oregon.

Campfire permits can be obtained free of cost at any ranger station and are required where campfires are to be built at any place other than designated camp grounds.

"This regulation has been in effect for the past two years, from July 1 to September 30. Forest users as a whole have co-operated excellently in carrying out this requirement and it has proved to be a definite factor in
