GALES CREEK BRIDGE CONTRACT AWARDED

Contract for the construction of the Gales creek bridge was awarded Monday morning to Edwin F. Balgermann of Portland with a bid of \$8402.90. The proposed structure will replace the bridge washed out last winter during the December flood.

Proposals were submitted to the county court by eight persons or firms. Balgermann was the low bidder for the work while the high bid amounted to \$10,964.50. Estimates by engineers had set the probable cost at approximately \$10,377.

Proposed bridge is to be 70 feet long, having a 24-foot roadway and be constructed with concrete. Washington county workmen selected from the files at the federal reemployment office will be used on the job.
