### PORTLAND BUSINESS PARALYZED BECAUSE OF MARINE STRIKE

Business in the Portland area has become practically paralyzed as a result of the marine strike now going into its third month, according to the July issue of Business Survey, issued this week by Commonwealth, Inc., of Portland. The Commonwealth index of Portland business fell to 49.38% of a computed normal during June against 60.26% for May and 65.52% for June 1933.

First affected were tidewater lumber mills most of which are virtually closed up due to inability to ship. Production in Portland area dropped 46% last month while mill stocks increased about 27% above last June. Furniture factories were forced to close or operated at greatly reduced schedules. Flour mills produced at about 42% of capacity and production in woolen textile mills was reduced by 25% from the May level.

Considerable reduction in employment and buying power is a natural consequence, says Business Survey, and retail trade is suffering as a result.

Most serious aspect of the strike, according to David Eccles, editor of Business Survey, is the fact that an acute shortage of gasoline may make wheat harvest extremely difficult. This fact combined with inability to move crops can possibly offset the excellent condition of crops in this territory.
